INTRODUCTION

The research of existing historic structures constitutes a first step towards identifying and protecting the intrinsic character of Independence Township. It consists of identifying and photographing historic structures, researching the structures, analyzing the research, and documenting the information uncovered.

The method used included documentation of on-site conditions, letters to property owners of identified structures, personal communication with resource people, research at Independence Township Library, Oakland County Register of Deeds, Pioneer Historic Society, Pontiac Public Library, and Independence Township Tax Records.

The visual and written research was analyzed and then recorded on Inventory Forms identifying the photographic views and documenting resources. A base map of Independence Township was also used to key the identified historic structures to their sites.

Independence Township was divided into six areas in order to identify the historic significance of each one. These areas are keyed to the inventory cards and the base map. The areas are: The Northwest Quadrant, Clinton River, Walter's Lake, Clarkston - Saginaw Trail, Pine Knob, and Sashabaw Plains. The Location of these areas are identified by the following Independence Township sections.

Northwest Quadrant contains part of sections 4, 9, and 16 and all of sections 5, 6, 7, 8, 17, and, 18.

Clinton River contains part of sections 3, 4, 9, 10, 15, 16, and 21.

Walter's Lake contains part of sections 3, 10, 13, 14, 15, and all of sections 1, 2, 11, and 12.

Clarkston - Saginaw Trail contains part of sections 19, 21, and 33, and all of sections 20, 21, 28, 29, 30, and 32.

Pine Knob contains sections 22, 23, and 24 in their entirety.

Sashabaw Plains contains sections 25, 26, 27, 34, 35, 36, and part of section 33.

Independence Township Inventory Form Terminology

Barn	A farm building used for storing farm products and sheltering livestock.
Church	A place for public Christian worship.
Contemporary House	For the purpose of this study the term Contemporary House refers to building constructed within the last fifty years. It does not refer to a style of architecture.
Farm	<p>Land cultivated for agricultural production. Land devoted to the raising and breeding of domestic animals.</p> <p>Word History: The word farm is derived from the Latin <i>firmus</i>, "fixed", "firm" whose Medieval Latin form, <i>firma</i>, meant "fixed payment." The earliest sense of English farm is that of a fixed amount payable as a tax or rent. It was a common practice to lease agriculture lands for a fixed annual rent instead of a percentage of the crop. The word <i>farm</i> was also applied to land occupied on such terms. from the 16th century <i>farm</i> was used to indicate any cultivated agricultural land, regardless of circumstances of its tenancy or ownership.</p> <p>For the purpose of this study the term "Farm" shall be used under the definition "Original Usage" if outbuildings still remain from the original farm. The term "Farm" shall be used under the definition "Present Usage" if the property is a working farm in 1991.</p>
Farmhouse	A building used as a dwelling by one or more families on a farm.
House	A building used as a dwelling by one or more families.
Land	A tract of land that is owned but the owner is not living on the property.
School house	A building used as a school.
Single-family Residence	The place in which one family lives.
Residence	The place in which one lives.
Silo	A tall cylindrical structure in which grain is stored.
